IN MAY, THE LARRY HISLE APARTMENTS RIBBON CUTTING TOOK PLACE IN HIS HOMETOWN OF PORTSMOUTH, OHIO. PORTSMOUTH METROPOLITAN HOUSING AUTHORITY (PMHA) AND SHAWNEE FAMILY HEALTH CENTER CREATED A SUPPORTIVE HOUSING INITIATIVE FOR MENTAL HEALTH AND THOSE AGING OUT OF FOSTER CARE. THE APARTMENTS ARE NESTLED IN THE HILLSIDES OF HISLE PARK, WHICH HOLDS 45 UNITS. IT IS THE FIRST PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FACILITY FOR VULNERABLE TRANSITIONAL AGE YOUTH, AGES 18-24, AND YOUNG FAMILIES IN SOUTHERN OHIO.














Joey Wiemer is mobbed after ripping a walk-off single in a 4-3 win vs. the Baltimore Orioles, his second walk-off of the season.



















IN MEMORIAM


JEFF PETEREK, signed by the Brewers as an amateur free agent in June 1985, compiled an impressive 57-30 record with a 3.46 ERA in five Minor League seasons, earning the right-hander a promotion to the Major Leagues in 1989. Jeff appeared in seven games for the '89 Brewers, four of them as a starter, posting a 0-2 record with a 4.02 ERA. He played two more seasons in the minors before retiring following the 1991 campaign. Peterek died of natural causes in Niles, Michigan on October 8, 2023, at the age of 60.

SANDY VALDESPINO, a member of the first Brewers' team in 1970, who made just nine plate appearances that season, died on February 26, 2023. He was 84. Valdespino was nicknamed "Sandy" because of his resemblance to fellow Cuban Sandy Amoros, a Brooklyn Dodgers outfielder in the 1950's. Sandy roomed with future Hall-of Fame pitcher Jim Kaat while the pair played for the Class C Missoula Timberjacks in 1958. Valdespino's best season was 1965 with the AL champion Minnesota Twins. Occasionally spelling leftfielder Bob Allison and rightfielder Tony Oliva, Sandy batted .261 in 108 games and went 3-for-11 in the World Series. He hit a double off another future Hall of Famer, Don Drysdale, to spark a six-run third inning in Game 1, an 8-2 Twins' victory. Sandy also played with Atlanta, Houston, the Seattle Pilots and Kansas City.

BOBBY BOLIN was one of a handful of pitchers who excelled in both starting and relief roles. Bolin completed 32 games and saved 51 others during his 13-year Major League career. An original member of the Milwaukee Brewers, Bolin posted a 5-11 record with a 4.91 ERA before his September 1970 trade to the Red Sox in exchange for outfielder AI Yates. Bobby hit his sixth and final Major League home run on May 11, 1970 at County Stadium. He is the oldest Brewers' pitcher to homer [31 years, three months, and 12 days]. The 6-foot, 4-inch fire-balling righthander posted an 88-75 mark with a 3.40 ERA during his career, the first nine of which were spent with San Francisco. A member of the 1962 Giants' World Series team, Bobby's best season was in 1965 [14-6, 2.78 ERA]. Bolin's 1.99 ERA in 1968 was the NL's second best, trailing only Bob Gibson's record-setting mark of 1.12. He died on June 2, 2023 at the age of 84 in Easley, South Carolina.

WAYNE COMER delivered a ninth-inning walk-off single to left field scoring Ted Savage to give the Brewers a 6-5 win in the opening game of a Sunday doubleheader on May 10, 1970. The run-scoring single would be the only base hit and RBI that Comer would collect for the Brew Crew, as he was traded to Washington following the twinbill in exchange for Hank Allen. Although Wayne had a 13-year professional baseball career, only five were in the Major Leagues, three of which were in Detroit. Wayne was a member of the 1968 World Champion Tigers and compiled a perfect 1.000 World Series batting average with a pinch-hit single in Game 3 of the Fall Classic. Comer's best season was with the 1969 Seattle Pilots. He topped the team with 88 runs scored, led the American League in double plays turned as an outfielder, ranked second in the league in assists by an outfielder, and compiled a .735 DPS. Comer died on October 4, 2023, at the age of 79.

FRANK HOWARD was a beloved Brewers coach from 1977-80 and again from 1985-86, mentoring future Hall of Famers Robin Yount and Paul Molitor. Frank played both baseball and basketball at Ohio State University and was good enough to be drafted by the NBA's Philadelphia Warriors. He chose to sign with the Dodgers instead and in his first professional season with the Minor League Green Bay Bluejays, Howard led the league with 37 home runs while batting .333 and driving in 119 runs. More than a few of his round-trippers landed in the East River beyond the outfield fence at Green Bay's Joannes Park. He won the 1960 NL Rookie of the Year award and was a member of the 1963 World Champion Dodgers. Traded to Washington following the 1964 campaign, Howard twice led the AL with 44 home runs in both 1968 and 1970 along with 48 in 1969, while becoming one of the most popular players ever to play in the nation's

capital. He had nicknames such as "Hondo," "Gentle Giant," and "The Monster." He finished his career with 382 circuit clouts. The 6-foot, 7-inch Howard wore a size 54 shirt, 46-inch pants, and a 140 shoe.

Frank passed away on October 30, 2023. He was 87.

To fans of the 1982 Brewers, the image is as vivid today as it was more than 40 years ago. PETE LADD on the mound in the deciding game of the ALCS facing future Hall of Famer Rod Carew, two-outs with the tying run at second base. Ladd induced Carew to ground out to shortstop Robin Yount to preserve a 4-3 win and a trip to the World Series! Pandemonium at County Stadium as fans stormed the field! Thrust into the closer's role following a season-ending injury to Rollie Fingers, Peter notched a pair of saves in the ALCS and followed up with his best season in 1983, notching 25 saves and a 2.55 ERA. A 25th round selection by Boston in 1977, Ladd came to Milwaukee following the 1981 season after a stop in Houston. He spent the first part of the 1982 season with the Brewers' Triple-A affiliate in Vancouver before joining the Major League team in July. Nicknamed "Big Foot," Ladd appeared in 205 games during his six-year Major League career, 204 of those as a reliever. Ladd died on October 23, 2023, following a short battle with cancer. He was 67.

BILL CAMPBELL, who served as the pitching coach for the 1999 Milwaukee Brewers, died from cancer on January 6, 2023 at the age of 74. A relief pitcher, Campbell posted a 17-5 record with 20 saves for the 1976 Twins. Nicknamed "Soup," after the Campbell Soup Company, he followed this up with a career-high 31 saves for Boston in 1977. Campbell recorded 126 career saves and played with seven teams during his 15-year Major League career which ended with the Montreal Expos in 1987.
