
"I want my baseball jersey back, Mom. If I go to the Baseball Hall of Fame, do you think they will give it back to me?" the Phillie Phanatic asked.


All along Main Street there were stores selling baseball souvenirs and memorabilia. "I think I'm in heaven!" the mascot exclaimed.

The Phanatic spotted a life-size statue of one of baseball's all-time great players - Babe Ruth.






"My mom sent my favorite Phillies jersey to the Baseball Hall of Fame and I want it back. Do you know where it is?" the Phanatic asked.

The Phanatic thanked Babe and hurried on his way.







The Phanatic spotted plaques of two of his favorite Phillies players - Mike Schmidt and Steve Carlton - hanging on the wall with all the other great players.





"Psst... up here, Phanatic." The Phillie Phanatic looked up and saw Phillies all-time great, Richie "Whitey" Ashburn.




The legendary center fielder called down, "I know exactly where your jersey is. Go up the steps and past the broadcaster exhibit."

The Phillie Phanatic was part of the Hall of Fame!




The Phanatic watched as baseball fans of all ages gathered around the colorful statue, pointing and giggling and taking pictures.

## Fun Facts!

- ❖ The Baseball Hall of Fame first opened its doors to the public on June 12, 1939.
- ❖ The first five players inducted into the Hall of Fame were Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Honus Wagner, Christy Mathewson and Walter Johnson.
- ❖ Babe Ruth was the all-time leader in home runs with 714 until Hank Aaron broke his record in 1974.
- ❖ Lou Gehrig's nickname was the "Iron Horse" because he played in 2,130 consecutive games.

- ❖ On September 6, 1995, Cal Ripken Jr. broke Lou Gehrig's consecutive games played record. Cal's streak lasted an amazing 2,632 games!
- ❖ The Roberto Clemente Award is given annually to the player who best exemplifies the game of baseball, sportsmanship, community involvement and contributions to the team.
- ❖ Mike Schmidt is the all-time Phillies home run leader with 548 home runs.
- ❖ Richie "Whitey" Ashburn played center field for the Phillies, collecting 2,574 hits and batting .308 for his career.
- ❖ Richie Ashburn and Mike Schmidt were inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1995.
- ❖ Steve "Lefty" Carlton won the Cy Young Award four times. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1994.
- ❖ Although Abner Doubleday is credited with inventing the game of baseball, Alexander Cartwright crafted the first rules of the game in the 1840s.
- ❖ The Phillie Phanatic was enshrined as a permanent exhibit at the Baseball Hall of Fame on July 27, 2002.
